



AISPO is a Non-Governmental Organization founded by a group of operators from the Scientific Institute San Raffaele Hospital of Milan.


The Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs formally recognized AISPO in 1985 as an organization suited to implement international cooperation activities in developing countries in the health sector.

AISPO projects are characterized by:

- training and technical assistance to enhance healthcare services and staff capacities through on the job training, theoretical training, workshops and scholarships;
- ambitious civil works projects to **rehabilitate and equip healthcare units** from primary health centers to general hospitals to highly specialized hospital units.

AISPO mainly uses human resources available within the San Raffaele Hospital and the Vita-Salute San Raffaele University with which it is associated. Thanks to these links, the association has great expertise and know-how that make it a **unique organization** in the panorama of Italian NGOs.








Pediatric cardio surgery training on the job (Cairo)

The third year of the project saw the continuation of the in-service training activities for nurses in all governorates, the full implementation of the mentorship and tutorship programme in Port Said, the implementation of some cardiac surgery activities in Cairo and Port Said, including key procurement to ensure better outcomes for the most complex operations and the inclusion of the Technical Health Institute in Aswan in the project as a beneficiary of infrastructure activities. Finally, scholarships were implemented in Italy in the fields of both cardiac surgery and nursing.



New outpatient Department at Maternity hospital in Duhok

The project aimed to support the Duhok Maternity Hospital in reorganising its space and functions, by building and operating a new outpatient centre with prevention, vaccination, counselling and awareness-raising services. The action targeted Duhok Maternity Hospital, the only tertiary care level hospital in Duhok Province, providing free obstetric, gynecological and neonatal services to the population. The project aimed at establishing the new Out Patient Department, moving and reorganizing the services to a dedicated building in order to decrease the load on the main building, improving patients flows and access to the hospital and to the ambulatory services, as well as enhancing their quality.

The project aimed to improve access to maternal and newborn health services in the city of Ambanja through community outreach and a telemedicine system. Telemedicine is implemented through PANDA, an innovative, low-cost, high-quality telemedicine system developed for pregnancy consultations in difficult settings. At the heart of the system is a mobile application that guides the operator in the collection of screening data and results and provides guidance for the delivery of health education. An alert system informs the operator in case of pathological values. At the end of the medical examination, data and test results are sent to the database in the hospital, where the obstetric team opens a medical record for each woman and performs case supervision, defining frequency of follow-up and mapping of pregnancies by area, time and risk. The aim of the program is to achieve quality pre and postnatal examinations with updated data to be shared with the community to make it aware and participate in the effectiveness of public health measures.



The project activities combine research on biodiversity and its conservation with the training of both University and public institutions staff involved in biodiversity conservation and quality control related to the environment and the health of citizens. In fact, the study of communicable diseases, with particular regard to zoonosis, quality control of water and food, applying an advanced experimental approach, aims to create appropriate mechanisms for the transfer of scientific and technological knowledge from research centers to society and productive sectors. Construction activities (biobank, laboratories, offices), supply of laboratory and biobank equipment/consumables, staff training, scholarships are being implemented in Mozambique and in Italy in the coming months.









This three-year project aims to support access to blood and blood derivatives by patients in need of transfusion, particularly women in labor and pregnancy, newborns and children with severe anemia. The project is a second phase project of consolidation of a first phase also funded by AICS. This new proposal will continue to support the capital blood services by operating at Princess Christian Maternity Hospital (PCMH), will rehabilitate space that houses the blood bank at Connaught Hospital and will build a new regional blood transfusion center in the main public general hospital in Makeni, capital of the Northern Province. Scholarships will also be provided to the laboratory staff of Freetown and Makeni for training periods in Italy, as well as supply of equipment and consumables, targeted supervision of peripheral blood banks and support to the Governance of the system at central level. The project will support the national strategy to increase voluntary blood donation, doing awareness campaigns through mobile units. The proposal was written jointly with the Ministry of Health (MOHS), Partner in the first and in this second phase. In summary, the project will contribute to decrease the mortality rate, thanks to an increased availability of safe blood and blood products and the use of standardized transfusion therapies.



This two-year project aims to reduce inequalities in Sudan by strengthening and promoting inclusion. Specifically, it intends to support access to university education in the health professions of students belonging to the most vulnerable groups, in particular refugees and, among them, Christian minorities exposed to discrimination. It is of course open to all the population, without discrimination.

In partnership with Comboni College of Science and Technology (CCST), a new Bachelor of Science in Nursing Sciences has been activated with specialization in Palliative Care – Oncology and Obstetrics – Intensive Care Unit. The classrooms include simulation laboratories to integrate the theoretical course with practical activities in order to ensure quality learning for students, future professionals in the Sudanese health sector and reduce the risk of error on patients at the beginning of their career. The course will be hosted in the new building, currently under construction.







The project aim is to improve the performance of the health personnel of eight health centers, the Community Health Workers (CHWs) and the Traditional Birth Attendants (TBAs) in order to improve health care services for the whole population. The intervention will increase awareness, through awareness campaigns, among the population: i) on the danger of Coronavirus (COVID-19 infection), ii) on prevention procedures that can be adopted in the context of villages, iii) on the treatment and management of communicable diseases that are one of the causes of malnutrition in children under the age of 5 and women of childbearing age. The project indirectly strengthens the role of women in society and in the work environment, while transferring to the community key messages on health education, focused on personal hygiene and environmental protection. Rehabilitation works were implemented in the 8 health centers and consumables and equipment purchased. Moreover, during the project AISPO will collect data for an anthropometric survey. The targeted 8 health centers are Bussere, Taban, Gaitan, Mboro, Bringi, Bagari, Jebel, Khair e New Site.
